As we reflect on the year 2024, I am honored to present the Philippine Charity Sweepstakes Office's (PCSO) Year-End Report for 2024. In 2024, PCSO reached a total revenue of P62,353,516,114.95 from Lotto, Digit Games, Small Town Lottery, and Instant Sweepstakes, marking a 1.46% increase in sales compared to the previous year. These revenues enabled us to deliver life-changing charity assistance to 345,001 individuals and 523 institutions, totaling P4,219,695,160.50. Additionally, PCSO contributed to various agencies through mandatory contributions and paid taxes to the national government, playing a vital role in nation-building.

II. About PCSO

The Philippine Charity Sweepstakes Office (PCSO) is a 100% Government-Owned and Controlled Corporation (GOCC) under the Office of the President.

In March 1935, then President Manuel L. Quezon approved Act 4130 – the law passed by the Philippine Legislature on October 30, 1934, creating the Philippine Charity Sweepstakes Office, replacing the then National Charity Sweepstakes. On June 18, 1954, Republic Act 1169 (PCSO Charter) was enacted into law providing for charity sweepstakes and lotteries once a month when there are no sweepstakes draws and races. PCSO has since then remained to be the indispensable charity arm of the government, frequently summoned to provide funding for essential health and welfare activities and projects nationwide.

The mandate of PCSO is to conduct lottery games to raise revenues and provide funds for health, medical, and welfare-related activities and charities of national character.

Vision

PCSO is the principal government agency committed to excellence in generating sustainable funds for health programs and charities of national character through responsible gaming towards a prosperous, inclusive, and resilient society.

Mission

- We hold and conduct transparent sweepstakes races, lotteries, and other similar activities.
- We provide responsive assistance to eligible recipients and beneficiaries.

Revenue Allocation

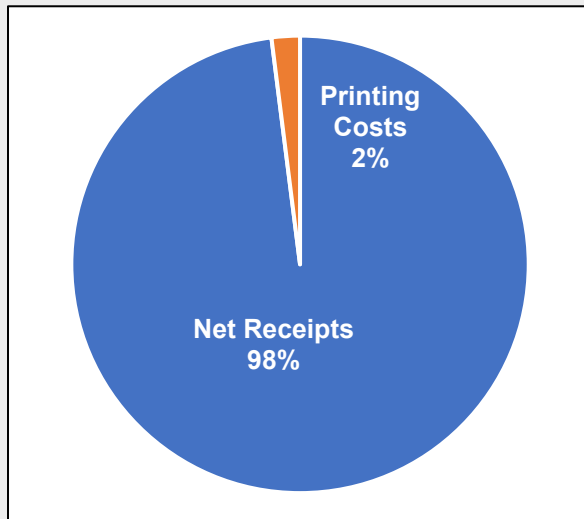


Figure 2 PCSO Gross Receipts

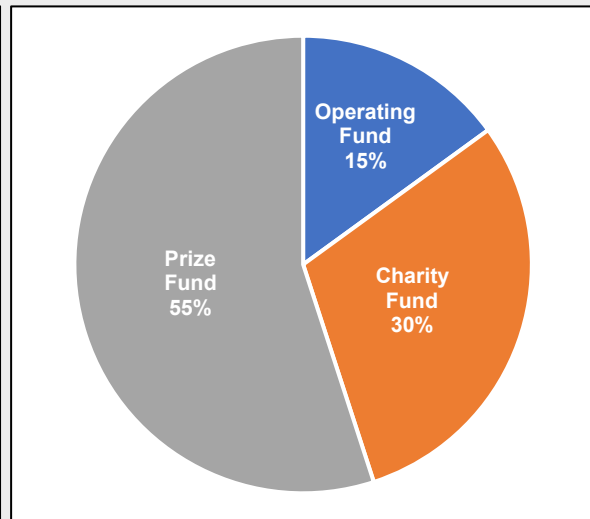


Figure 1 Allocation of the Net Receipts to the Three (3) PCSO Funds

Section 6 of the PCSO Charter provides that the net receipts (gross receipts minus the 2% printing cost), as shown in Figure 1, is divided among three distinct funds: the Prize Fund at 55%, the Charity Fund at 30%, and the Operating Fund at 15% (Figure 2).

The **Prize Fund**, which accounts for 55% of net receipts, is used to pay prizes to holders and sellers of winning tickets. Unclaimed prizes or balances in the Prize Fund revert to and become part of the Charity Fund after one (1) year.

The **Charity Fund**, which is 30% of net receipts, is exclusively used to finance and support health programs, medical assistance, and services, and charities of national character.

The **Operating Fund** consists of 15% of net receipts and is used to support PCSO's day-to-day operating/maintenance and capital expenditures. Unutilized Operating Fund at the end of the fiscal year also becomes part of the Charity Fund.

III. Operational Accomplishments



A. Fund Generation Activities

For CY 2024, PCSO performed well by generating a total of P62,353,516,114.95 from its gaming products, including Lotto, Digit Games, Small Town Lottery and Instant Sweepstakes.

1. Sales Comparison between CY 2024 vs. CY 2023

Sales for CY 2024 have increased by 1.46% compared to CY 2023, as shown in Table 1.

In 2024, Small Town Lottery emerged as top revenue generator with P31,761,278,394.95 total sales.

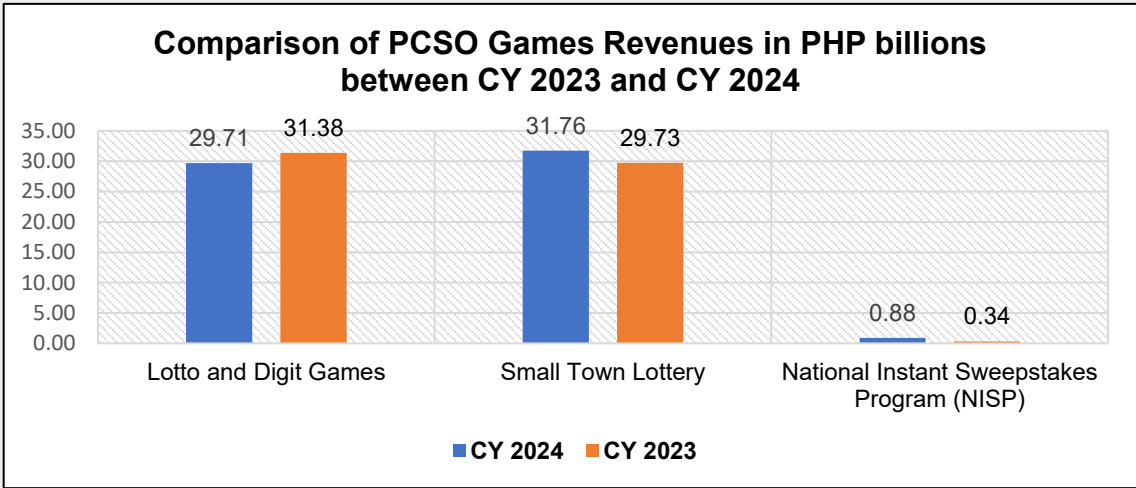


Figure 3 Comparison of PCSO Games Revenues, CY 2024 vs CY 2023

Figure 3 below illustrates the comparison of retail receipts per PCSO game for CYs 2024 and 2023. Based on the graph, the gross retail receipts from Small Town Lottery and NISP in CY 2024 are higher than the gross retail receipts of the same games in CY 2023. On the other hand, the gross retail receipts of Lotto including Digit Games decreased in CY 2024 when compared to the figures in CY 2023.

2. Sales Breakdown of PCSO Lotto Games

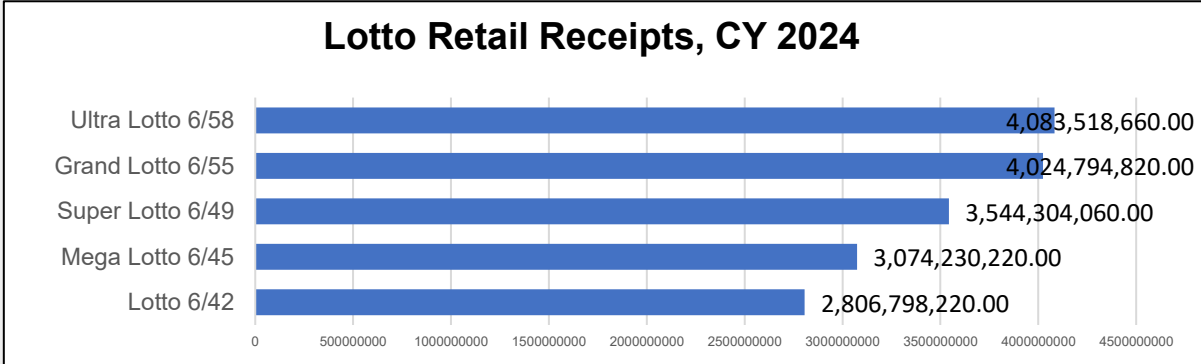


Figure 4 Lotto Retail Receipts, CY 2024

Lotto including Digit Games generated a total of P29,717,237,720.00 in CY 2024. Figure 4 details the performances of these games, with the Ultra Lotto 6/58 generating the highest revenue at P4,083,518,660.00 out of the total of P17,533,645,980.00.

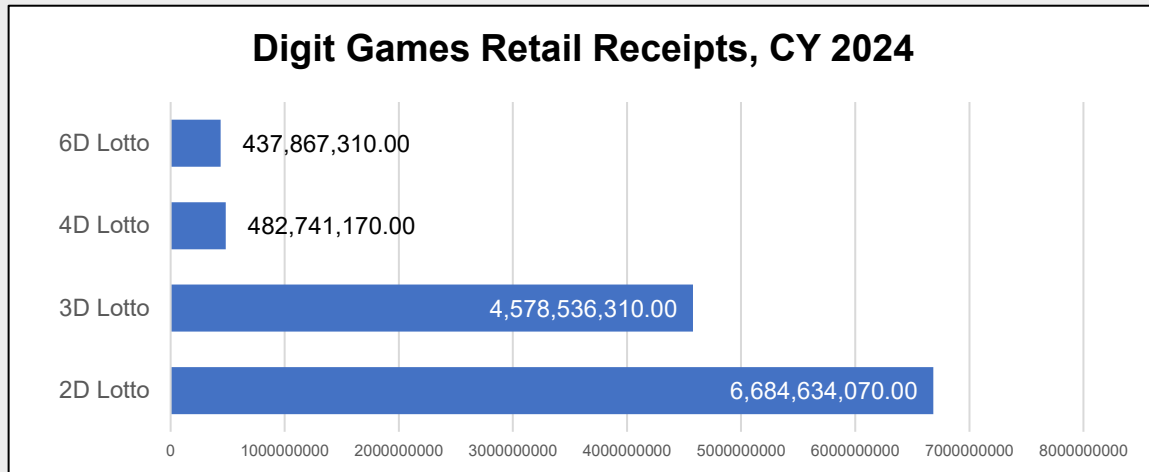


Figure 5. Digit Games Retail Receipts for CY 2024

For Digit Games which generated a total of P12,183,778,860.00 for CY 2024, the 2D Lotto is the highest sales contributor with P6,684,634,070.00 revenues (Figure 5).

Lastly, Instant Sweepstakes produced revenues totaling P875 million from January to December 2024.

3. Percent Contribution of PCSO Games to the Total Revenue

An analysis of sales data shows that Small Town Lottery accounted for 51% of total gross retail receipts, followed closely by Lotto including Digit Games, which contributed 48% and Instant Sweepstakes accounted for 1%.

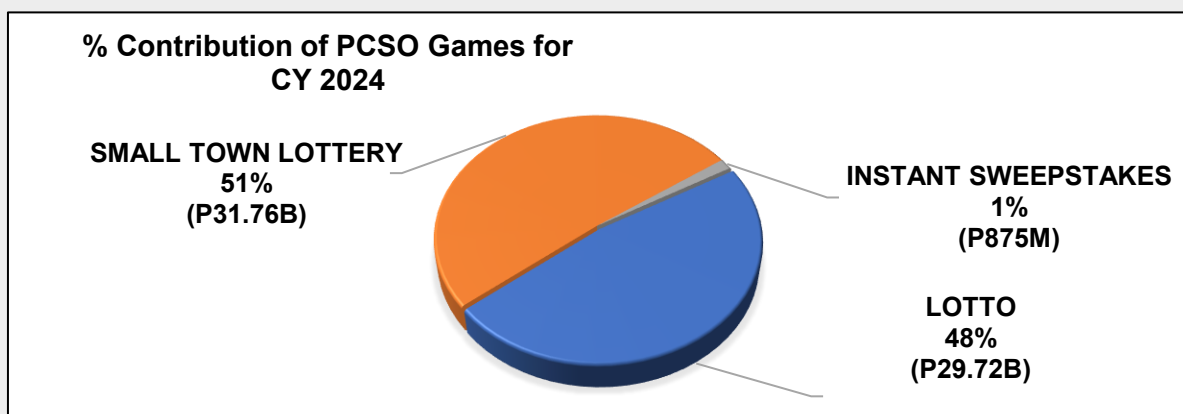


Figure 6. Percentage Contribution of PCSO Games for CY 2024

B. Promoting Responsible Gaming: Ensuring Safe and Fair Play

PCSO is dedicated to promoting Responsible Gaming (RG) while fulfilling its mandate to generate funds for health programs, medical assistance, and charitable services. PCSO aligns its RG initiatives with global best practices and has recently achieved Level 2 Certification from the World Lottery Association (WLA) Responsible Gaming Framework (RGF).

The WLA Independent Assessment Panel (IAP) recognized PCSO's commitment to responsible gaming, noting that all program elements were addressed. The IAP encouraged PCSO to continue strengthening its RG initiatives by consulting with other lotteries, improving training programs, and enhancing its reporting mechanisms to work toward Level 3 Certification.

C. Changed Lives: Jackpot Winners for 2024

In 2024, a total of 82 individuals won jackpot prizes of the various lotto games with a total of P5,314,394,828.80. Table 4 shows the accumulated jackpot prizes per game and accumulated number of winners for each lotto game.

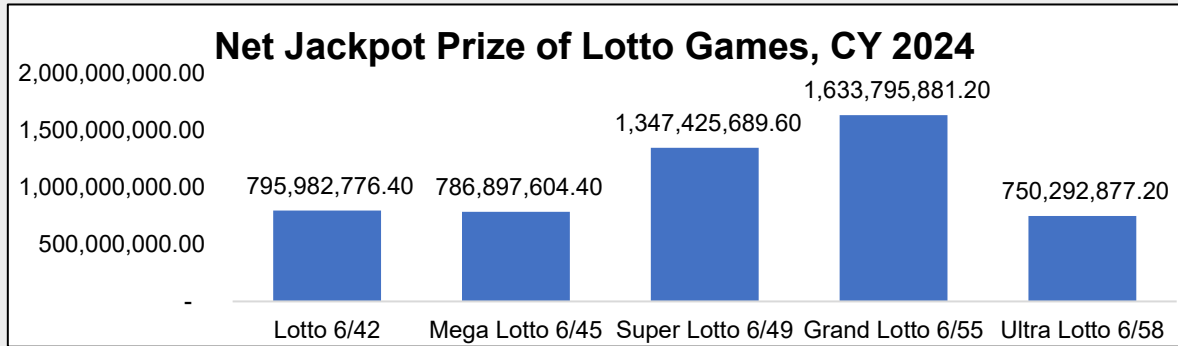


Figure 7. Total Jackpot Prize Winnings for CY 2024

Grand Lotto 6/55 produced the highest accumulated jackpot prize share for the whole year at P1,633,795,881.20, while the lowest accumulated jackpot prize share came from Ultra Lotto 6/58 at P750,292,877.20.

D. Fund Provision

PCSO is mandated to provide funds for various charity programs, including direct assistance to indigent patients, collaboration with local government units, and partnerships with other government agencies.

1. Charity Programs

PCSO has been implementing various charity programs that assist indigents and financially incapacitated individuals needing financial and medical assistance.

In 2024, nine (9) programs were funded by the Charity Fund, namely: a.) Medical Assistance Program (MAP), provided through the i.) PCSO Offices and ii.) Malasakit Centers; b.) Institutional Partnership Program; c.) Medical Transport Vehicle Donation Program; d.) Medical Equipment Donation Program; e.) Out-patient Services; f.) Medicine Donation Program; g.) Medical and Dental Mission; h.) Employees Consultation and Management; and i.) Patient Transport Services.

From January to December 2024, PCSO provided charity assistance and medical services to a total of 341,460 individuals and 523 institutions, amounting to P4,219,695,160.50. Table 5 illustrates the performance of PCSO's charity programs for CYs 2023 and 2024.

The subsequent sections outline the fund provision activities of PCSO through its programs and services.

a. Medical Assistance Program

The Medical Assistance Program (MAP) is the flagship program of PCSO, through which patients in need receive financial assistance to defray medical expenses incurred from treatment or confinement. This support is granted through the issuance of a Guarantee Letter, easing the burden of costly healthcare.

For CY2024, PCSO assisted 326,482 beneficiaries under the Medical Assistance Program, with assistance amounting to P3,242,164,632.61.

The following sections show the PCSO MAP assistance per category.

i. Regular Medical Assistance Program through PCSO Offices

The Regular Medical Assistance Program (MAP) aids persons with health-related problems in partnership with government and private hospitals, health facilities, medicine retailers, and other partners. Services covered by the program are confinement, erythropoietin (dialysis injection), chemo drugs, specialty medicines, hemodialysis, laboratory (blood chemistry), diagnostic/imaging procedures, and implant/medical devices.

From January to December 2024, PCSO provided P2,529,237,825.44 to 266,865 beneficiaries under the Regular Medical Assistance Program (MAP).

ii. Medical Assistance Program thru Malasakit Centers

Republic Act No. 11463, or the Malasakit Center Act seeks to establish Malasakit Centers in hospitals run by the Department of Health (DOH) nationwide. These centers serve as a one stop-shop for indigent and financially incapacitated individuals seeking financial and medical assistance. These facilities are established to provide Filipinos with convenient, free, accessible, and efficient medical services.

As one of the participating agencies mandated by the law, PCSO provides assistance to patients in these Malasakit Centers. By the end of 2024, PCSO helped 59,617 beneficiaries with assistance amounting to P712,926,807.17.

b. Institutional Partnership Program

c. Medical Transport Vehicle Donation Program

The Medical Transport Vehicle Donation Program (MTVDP) provides Patient Transport Vehicles (PTVs) to provinces, municipalities, and cities located in conflict-stricken or vulnerable communities, as well as the Geographically Isolated and Disadvantaged Areas (GIDA). The PTVs are used to transport patients requiring immediate medical treatment quickly and safely to, from, and between medical facilities.

For CY 2024, PCSO donated 431 PTVs amounting to P913.72 million to various LGUs nationwide. Below is the list of PTV recipients for CY 2024.

e. Medicine Donation Program

The Medicine Donation Program provides basic medicines and supplies to government and non-government, non-profit organizations, and health facilities to enable them to help sick individuals.

From January to December 2024, the agency donated P1,200,103.52 worth of medicines to 17 LGUs and health/government facilities.

f. Multi-Specialty Clinic

Under the Multi-Specialty Clinic, partner doctors who specialize in various fields like neuropsychiatry, OB-GYN, ENT, orthopedics, among others, accommodate the public who need free medical consultation.

In 2024, PCSO assisted 2,532 patients who visited the Agency's multi-specialty clinic.

g. Out-Patient Services

Under the Out-Patient Services, PCSO doctors and nurses accommodate the public who need free medical and dental consultation.

For 2024, the Medical Services Department gave free consultations and medicines to 4,851 individuals with assistance amounting to P219,669.01.

h. Medical and Dental Mission

Through Medical and Dental Missions, PCSO provides medical consultations, basic dental services like tooth extraction, and basic medicines to various recipients.

In CY 2024, PCSO conducted 27 medical and dental missions including special missions in various areas where the agency assisted 5,527 individuals and provided P232,217.96 worth of assistance.

i. Employees Consultation and Management

This program provides in-house consultations and medicines to employees, their dependents, and retirees. For CY 2024, medical and dental supplies totaling P222,662.07 were used for the consultation and treatment of 7,576 cases.

j. Patient Transport Service (Ambulance Conduction)

The Patient Transport Service provides free ambulance services to patients needing transport from hospital to their homes, from hospital to hospital, or from any PCSO facility to hospital. For 2024, PCSO provided free transportation to 19 individuals.

2. Compliance with Mandatory Contributions

In compliance with various laws and regulations, PCSO disbursed a total of P5,345,947,962.04 to various institutions in CY 2024.

A. Corporate Activities

PCSO Implements Data Privacy Act

May 16-17, 2024

This workshop aimed at identifying and mitigating privacy risks associated with PCSO's operations, thereby ensuring the protection of personal information and reinforcing the agency's adherence to best practices in data management.

April 15-16, 2024

PCSO conducted the 2025 Strategic Planning Workshop for its Top Management including its Board of Directors. As a result of the workshop, the PCSO was able to craft its 2025 Performance Scorecard containing the targets and planned achievements of the agency for CY 2025.

Malacañang Appoints New Members of the Board of Directors

May / June 2024

Judge Felix P. Reyes (Ret.) was appointed as the Chairperson of the Philippine Charity Sweepstakes Office on May 28, 2024 followed by the appointment of Ms. Imelda A. Papin on June 10, 2024 as Member of the Board of Directors. The complete line-up of officials strengthened the commitment of PCSO to ensure the fulfillment of its mandate to raise and provide funds for the Filipino people.

PCSO is Recertified under ISO 9001:2015

PCSO successfully passed the ISO 9001:2015 recertification audit conducted by DQS Certification Philippines. This attests to PCSO's meeting international standards for quality management which helps in consistently providing high-quality services to the public and ensures customer satisfaction. V. Contributions to Nation-Building

A. Tax Remittances

PCSO contributes to nation-building by diligently paying its taxes to the National Government through the Bureau of Internal Revenue (BIR).

For CY 2024, the Agency paid BIR a total of P16,769,468,109.06. Documentary Stamp Tax accounts for 74.38% of all taxes paid, amounting to 12,473,059,526.98 (Table 12).

B. Dividends Payment

The PCSO, as a GOCC, continues to contribute to the national coffers by remitting at least Fifty Percent (50%) of its annual net earnings to the National Government as pursuant to Republic Act 7656.

For FY 2024, dividends amounting to **P2,539,400,299.33** was remitted to the Bureau of Treasury (BOT) representing FY 2023 dividends.

VI. Customer Feedback Mechanisms

To be more accessible and responsive to its stakeholders especially its gaming patrons and charity program beneficiaries, PCSO utilizes a variety of methods to generate and act on external feedback such as inquiries, complaints, suggestions, as well as commendations/compliments made to PCSO.

A. 8888 Hotline

From January to December 2024, PCSO achieved a 100% resolution rate for concerns received in the 8888 Hotline, answering and resolving 80 out of 80 concerns/complaints received, of which 76 concerns/complaints were addressed within 72 hours.
